Present perfect 1 (I have done)

Study this example situation:



Tom can't find his key. He's lost his key. (= He has lost ...)

he **has lost** his key =

he lost it and he doesn't have it now

have lost / **has lost** is the *present perfect simple*:

finished I/we/they/you have (= I've etc.) lost done he/she/it has (= he's etc.) been etc.

The present perfect simple is **have/has** + past participle. The past participle often ends in -ed (finished/decided etc.), but many verbs are irregular (lost/done/written etc.).

For a list of irregular verbs, see Appendix 1.

| | | When we use the present perfect, there is a connection with <i>now</i> . The action in the past has a result <i>now</i> : |

. Consider the second s

- Tom **has lost** his key. (= he doesn't have it *now*)
- ☐ He told me his name, but I've forgotten it. (= I can't remember it now)
- Sally is still here. She **hasn't gone** out. (= she is here *now*) I can't find my bag. Have you seen it? (= do you know where it is now?)

Compare gone (to) and been (to):

- James is on holiday. He **has gone to** Italy. (= he is there now or on his way there)
- Amy is back home now. She **has been** to Italy. (= she has now come back)

You can use the present perfect with **just**, **already** and **yet**.

Just = a short time ago:

- (No, I've just had lunch.)
- ☐ Hello. **Have** you **just arrived**?

Already = sooner than expected:

- 'Don't forget to pay the bill.' 'I've already paid it.'
- 'What time is Mark leaving?' 'He's already left.'

Yet = until now. We use **yet** to show that we are expecting something to happen.

We use **yet** in questions and negative sentences:

- Has it stopped raining yet?
- i've written the email, but I haven't sent it yet.
- You can also use the past simple (did, went, had etc.) in the examples on this page. So you can say:
 - Ben isn't here. He's gone out. or He went out.
 - 'Are you hungry?' 'No, I've just had lunch.' or 'No, I just had lunch.'
